2025-26 School Year

Demographic Disparity Analysis

- While CTE, PTECH, and Special Education lacked an established mechanism for tracking device-related incidents, the unique nature of these programs ensured that no students faced disciplinary consequences solely for phone possession.
- Adirondack Academy maintained a comprehensive data tracker that logged every reported violation, regardless of severity.
- Across all programs—including Adirondack Academy—no disciplinary consequences were issued strictly for the use of an internet-enabled device; lesser interventions were utilized unless the infraction occurred alongside a more serious violation.

Mitigation Action Plan

- To ensure consistent monitoring, a dedicated tracking mechanism has been integrated into the shared Learning Management System (LMS) utilized across all programs, allowing for the systematic and standardized recording of cell phone violations.
